The Madison Historical Society held its January meeting at the hall, 12 members being present. The

meeting was opened by the chairman, Herbert Weston with the Lord's prayer and salute to the flag.

The records of the December meeting were read and approved.

It was reported the tanks [oil] had been moved into the hall. Balance on hand from the treasurer's report, \$187.72.

A necklace that is at least 150 years old which belonged to Jennie Mac-Donald was given to the society.

After a discussion it was voted to do repair work on the kitchen, especially the ceiling. \$75 was appropriated for this purpose.

Mr. Weston read the directions on how a "pound" was constructed. Mrs. Weston's program was "old legal papers." She read several of these and then they were discussed. These copies are very interesting, the old script, the use of the language and the very clear and concise way in which they were written. Some of these papers dated back to 1853. Thank you Mrs. Weston for a very informative and interesting meeting.

Refreshments of very delicious apple pie, ice cream, cheese and coffee were served by Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Meader.

The next meeting of the Society will be February 20 at the hall.

Linda Smith recently received a little notebook filled with Madison School newspaper articles from Carolyn Gilman Guyer as a donation to the museum. In Carolyn's letter she notes that:

Sewell Kennett was my uncle—he married Florence Gilman—my father's sister.

She goes on to say:

I cannot tell you who compiled this, but there is a list in the book headed "Mrs. Sadie Gilman", who was my paternal grandmother, and mother to Arthur Gilman and Florence Gilman, and wife of Herbert Harmon Gilman.

Unfortunately, there are no dates except within a few of the articles, mostly written in the years of 1925 and 1926. The newspaper was probably **The Reporter**.

Here are a few excerpts:

Madison High School Notes

School opened Monday, Sept. 14, 1925, with a total enrollment of 35. Mr. Stuart Edgerly of Omaha, Nebraska, is the new headmaster.

It was with sorrow and regret that we heard of Mr. Conner's death in the late summer and he is sadly missed in the school. The headmaster, however, is proving an able successor and a pleasant year is anticipated.

The Knights of Good English held an election of officers Friday, Sept. 18, with the following results:

President, Henry Hobbs; Vice President, Pearl Granville; Secretary, Esther Jackson: Treasurer. Paul Nason. The President appointed the following committee for the first month: Program, Beatrice Giles, Chairman, Reginald Lyman, Eulalie Pascoe; Publicity, Florence Gilman, Chairman, Rhonda Pearson, Harriet Meloon; Work, Alfred Moody, Chairman, Leonard Bickford, Eleanor Nason. The following program was enjoyed after the business meeting. Singing, School; Welcome to Freshmen, Frances Thompson; Welcome to School, Headmaster Edgerly; Piano Solo, Eulalie Pearson; Recitation, Frank Pearson; Singing, School. After the program, the senior girls served refreshments of sandwiches, cake and cocoa, as a welcome to the Freshmen.

Tuesday night, the school is planning a corn roast. We hope all will be able to attend.

MADISON HIGH SCHOOL

Tuesday night, M. H. S. enjoyed the first social event of the season. This was a corn and weenie roast at Silver Lake Bathing Beach. Nearly all the students were present and a jolly time was had by all of them.

The weather prevented immediate action but new bats, balls, etc. were ordered so that when the grounds were ready we could begin practicing at once.

[Luther] Hill, '25, is the shortstop at present, having been changed from second. And when "Lute" starts for the ball, it means the finish for the batter.

[Roland] Lyman, '24, is playing second and generally stops the ball in time to get the batter.

[Arthur] Gilman, '24, is our star third baseman and also one of our heavy hitters. "Rip" can surely rip the balls.

[Albert] Conner, '25, is at present alternating between first and the box. "Al" is Madison's best on first and when it comes to pitching is so fast that the

opposing team cannot see his steam.

[Austin] Savary, '24, is Madison's backstop and is doing excellent work. When "Savary" whips to the bases, the runner needs wings if he thinks to arrive safe.

[Roland] Ward, '24, our old pitcher, is working well and will win his share of the games this year. "Nellie" has plenty of speed and is very heady.

[Paul] Nason, '26, [Sewall] Kennett, '25, and [Carroll] Welch, '25, our fielders, do good work when it comes to catching flies. Paul, "Suzie" and "Cappy" also do much to our batting strength.

Madison opened the season by attempting to play Kennett April 24th in a blizzard. The game was called in the fifth inning. The Kennett boys seemed to be superior in the snow and ran to shelter with the score 9 to 1 in their favor.
