

Are we ready for a great exhibit this summer? The Madison Historical Society is pleased to announce its 2018 summer exhibit:



### "Quilts...Then and Now"

An exhibit featuring the quilts of our Madison residents, their friends and ancestors.

Now comes the difficult part. Like our very successful Wedding Dresses through the Decades show in 2016, we are asking our Historical Society members and residents/friends to consider a temporary loan of your quilt(s) for

this exhibit. Our building now has a fully operating alarm system to keep our collections safe; however, we do not have a sprinkler system in case of fire. Like the previous show, we will do all we can to protect your quilts. The general public will not be allowed to touch them, only our gloved docents. The exhibit will be on display from June to Labor Day, and you may remove your quilt at any time after our Gala opening fundraising event. 
### MADISON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL 3RD AND 4TH GRADERS

Dear Members

The churches during WWII, 1941-1945, often were sending care packages all over the world to their local servicemen and often hung a service flag with each star for each serviceman.

Mail from home, newspapers, local snapshots, any news at all was treasured by those in jungles, artic, aboard ships, in Africa desert, or any place not home. Thousands of displaced men drafted by the government ages 18<sup>th</sup> birthday to age 40 if single were "in service."

Our Epworth League of Methodist teen-agers often did addressing envelopes (with A.P.O.'s) for Ladies Aid Oldsters.

Those were nerve-wracking mail-times, so important. Rachel Ward

Here is a nice winter recipe:

### WHITE CHILI



#### Ingredients:

2 tablespoons olive oil  
1 large onion, chopped  
3 cloves of garlic, crushed  
1 cup cooked chicken, cubed  
8 oz can of chopped green chilis  
2 tablespoons cumin  
2 teaspoons oregano  
1/8 teaspoon chili powder  
Dash pepper  
2 cups chicken broth  
2 cans drained white hominy  
1 can black eyed peas (drained & mashed)  
1 can black eyed peas (not drained)  
1 can cannellini beans (drained & rinsed)

#### Directions:

Sauté onion and garlic in olive oil.  
Add the rest of the ingredients.  
Simmer 1 hour. If you like more spice,  
add dash tabasco and a chopped  
seeded jalapeno pepper.  
Add cilantro and grated cheese when  
it is served.

We are particularly fortunate to have a rare 1-10 scale Bridge Truss Pattern used in the construction of covered bridges in the early 1800s.
